An Appreciation of Film -The Leicester Film Society in the 1930s 3-4pm, Clephan 3.01

FREE

The Leicester Film Society, founded in 1931, was one of the first film societies in the UK. It was set up to promote the artistic possibilities of cinema and to screen the kind of films that were not shown in the mainstream cinemas, including revolutionary Soviet films not passed by the Censor. Using recently donated archive material and film extracts, Sue Porter (DMU) reconstructs some of the fascinating programmes and considers the culture and politics of the society during its formative years.

CHRISTOPHER DAVIES

Bamboozle Theatre - Interacting learningdisabled audiences through theatre 4-5pm, Clephan 0.01 FREE

Bamboozle Theatre is an internationally acclaimed company that works in theatres with children that have learning difficulties. This talk, delivered by their artistic director Christopher Davies, looks at the challenges learning disabled children face when communicating in the world. He explains the impact that the Bamboozle approach has on such children's experience and demonstrates, through use of video clips, the key elements of the teaching that can be applied in a wide variety of theatre and education settings.

DAVID OLUSOGA

In Conversation 7.30-8.30pm, Clephan 2.13 £3, (£2 conc)

We are thrilled to welcome renowned historian, broadcaster, film-maker and presenter David Olusoga. David is author of *The World's War* (winner of the First World War Book of the Year in 2015) and *Black and British: A Forgotten History.* An award-winning documentary maker, his most recent TV series include the highly acclaimed A House Through Time and the BAFTA winning Britain's Forgotten Slave Owners (BBC 2). An expert on military history, empire, race and slavery, David is one of the three presenters on the BBC's landmark arts series 'Civilisations'. For Cultural eXchanges he is in conversation with Serena Dyer (DMU) about history, TV and his highly successful series A House Through Time. **Early booking recommended**.

TRAVIS ALABANZA

Travis Alabanza is a writer, theatre maker and performer based in London. In the last four years they have been noted by numerous publications and figures as one of the most prominent emerging figures in trans art and public thought. Their work has appeared in *The Guardian, BBC, Dazed, ID, Vice* as well as performing and speaking in venues across countries such as The Tate, ICA, V&A, Harvard University, Oxford and more. Their recent show Burgerz toured across the UK and Europe in 2019, winning the Total Theatre Edinburgh Fringe Award, voted Guardian Readers Favourite show, and acclaimed success after a sold out run at Southbank Centre. Travis Alabanza works to archive and discuss the issues facing gender non-conforming and trans people, at the intersections of class and sexuality. They are joined in conversation by Roisin Forde, DMU Student Union's LGBTQ representative.



DILWYN PORTER

English Gentlemen and World Football: Corinthians, Amateurism and the Global Game 6-7pm, Clephan 0.01 FREE

An elite football club in every sense, the famous Corinthians carried the banner for gentlemanly amateurism at a time when 'the People's Game' was embedding itself in popular culture. They also toured extensively, not just at home, but in Europe, South Africa, the USA, Canada and Brazil, establishing a global presence and a global brand. Recent research, however, suggests that they were not quite what they seemed. This illuminating talk is given by Dilwyn Porter, Emeritus Professor of Sports History and Culture (DMU) and co-author of *English Gentlemen and World Football*.

KATHARINE HAMNETT

'In Conversation' via live link 6-7pm, Hugh Aston Building 0.08 FREE

Cultural eXchanges is honoured to welcome via live link iconic fashion designer Katharine Hamnett. Hamnett is one of the pioneers of modern British fashion. She invented the much copied slogan t-shirt, was the first to use distressed denim, and championed organic cotton long before many were aware of the damage that conventional production causes to the environment. Katharine Hamnett, especially so in the 1980's, influenced both British popular culture and politics through the strength of her work. She was also the first designer to win the British Fashion Council's 'Designer of the Year' award in 1984. An outspoken designer she has been championing sustainability in fashion for 30 years. In this 'In Conversation...' she talks to Dr Claire Lerpiniere (DMU) about ethical industry practices and her fight for sustainability within the fashion industry. Early booking recommended.

ADRIAN VARELA CONCERT

'Laberinto' 6-6.45pm Adrian Varela In Conversation with Chris Heighton (DMU) 7-8pm Laberinto concert Second Floor, Campus Centre 2.01 and 2.02 FREE

Adrian Varela studied conducting with the legendary Lorin Maazel and is the Conductor and Artistic Director of The Polish National Youth Orchestra and the One Tree Hill Sinfonia, London. Adrian has led a remarkable life having lived through civil unrest and the military dictatorship in 1970's Uruguay and also joined thousands of others to help tear down the Berlin Wall in 1989. A member of the Philharmonia Orchestra since 2002, Adrian combines his role as a violinist in the orchestra with Prog-rock, Post-Tango band 'Laberinto' – an epic musical journey through an immersive multi-media labyrinth of rock, tango, classical and jazz, performed by Adrian and a quartet of virtuosic musicians who have worked with Freddy Mercury, Ozzy Osbourne and the Pasadena Roof Orchestra. In 2017, Adrian was appointed musical director and conductor of the Orchestra of De Montfort University.

Join Adrian Varela in conversation with Chris Heighton (DMU) at 6.15pm for a fascinating insight into Adrian's early life in Buenos Aires, late-night jam sessions with Nigel Kennedy, daily life in the Philharmonia Orchestra and exploring how the musical influences of tango, classical, prog-rock and jazz combine to create 'Laberinto'.


STUART PRICE

Managerialism, Populism and Fascism: a comparative analysis 2-3pm, Clephan 3.03 FREE

This talk examines the commonalities and differences that characterise three forms of intervention in the political/industrial sphere. The differences lie in the fact that one is a mode of control, one is a form of address, and one is a type of organised hysteria. The similarities lie in the fact that all three are instruments, the ultimate and sometimes unknowing purpose of which is to defend capital accumulation and the patriarchal state that guarantees the continued reproduction of class inequality. Stuart Price (DMU) is Director of the Media Discourse Centre and the author or editor of a dozen books, including the recent collection *Journalism, Power and Investigation: global and activist perspectives* (2019).

(RE) WRITING LEICESTER 3-4pm, Clephan 3.01 FREE

Two novelists explore real and re-imagined spaces in fictionalised Leicester. Rod Duncan's Fall of the Gas-Lit Empire series is set in an SF and Steampunk-inspired alternate history of the city; Philip Tew's first novel, *Afterlives*, is inspired by living and studying in Leicester 1972-1981, and features Leicester-based writers Sue Townsend and Dr Chris Challis.

Aubrey Whitfield is one of the UK's leading female record producers. She is also a songwriter and musician and has collaborated with some of the world's best-selling artists including Kelly Clarkson, Little Mix and Soul II Soul. An educator who supports students studying music production, Aubrey is in conversation with Dr Jacqui Norton (DMU) about her career and women in the music business.

TOM MILLS

The Public Service Myth: the BBC and its apologists 5-6pm, Clephan 3.01 FREE

With reference to the recent general election, this talk examines the notion of 'impartiality' and independence and their promotion by the BBC as core institutional values. Dr Mills argues that the BBC has only ever exhibited a very limited form of independence, and that its reporting has always reflected elite interests, but that its capacity to deliver impartial reporting has now been fatally undermined. Tom Mills is Lecturer in Sociology and Policy at the University of Aston, and the author of The BBC: the myth of a public service (2016).

BARRY DUFOUR

Not Enough Music: a critique of music education in schools in England 5-6pm, Clephan 1.16 FREE

Dr Barry Dufour, visiting Professor of Education Studies (DMU), outlines the findings of his three years of research published this year by De Montfort University's new publishing house. He explores the current situation of the marginalisation of music, but also talks about some inspiring local and national provision. Music teachers and everyone interested in education are welcome.

ARTS IN PRISONS

Wayout TV: a new in-cell TV channel dedicated to effective in-cell information and bite-sized factual and educational programming is changing the way UK prisons communicate with their residents. Jezz Wright, a former BBC Producer who now heads up this unique channel shares the lessons learnt in implementing this unique national TV experiment. Dr Victoria Knight (DMU) will illustrate how her research on television in prison can illuminate some of these topical issues in prisons. This event is chaired by Dr Jacqui Norton (DMU).

Acclaimed production designer Joseph Bennett has worked with numerous directors and photographers over the last 30 years, designing sets for multiple projects. A two times Emmy Award winner for his work on HBO's Rome, he has designed feature films such as Michael Winterbottom's Jude, Richard Stanley's Hardware, Gillian Armstrong's Charlotte Gray and Paul Anderson's Event Horizon. Alongside his work in film, Bennett also designed all of Alexander McQueen's fashion shows from 1999 as well as the Alexander McQueen : Savage Beauty exhibition at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York. A rare opportunity to have an audience with a top industry name, Bennett is joined in conversation by Ulrike Kubatta (DMU) about his illustrious career.

VAMPIRELLA

Vampirella is one of the most notorious unmade British films of the 20th Century. In 2019 ten actors performed a dramatized reading of Hammer Film's unmade 1975 Vampirella screenplay in London. Join Kieran Foster (DMU) for a talk about the wider context of the Vampirella project, including unseen footage of the reading. This is followed by a discussion between Kieran and Jonathan Rigby, the director of the London show, about the logistics of adapting a screenplay like this for a reading. The event finishes with a Q and A.

Award-winning photographer David Bebber (*The Times, Reuters*) discusses his recent exhibition that focuses on the vital work done by international conservation charity the World Land Trust. Working alongside its partner organisations they help protect threatened habitats and wildlife around the world. From Vietnam to Armenia, Borneo to Paraguay the natural world is under threat. Bebber's photographs aim to offer a glimpse into what is at stake in these countries and the people working to prevent it being lost.

Hunter entered the country just before the death of Kim Jong-il and compiled an extraordinary record of daily life in one of the least-known states on earth. He utilises much of the country's actual propaganda as well as his own photographs and videos obtained through DPRK to shine a light into one of the darkest corners of the world. It is an astonishing tale, not to be missed.

Dance artists/academics Sally Doughty (DMU), Lisa Kendall and Rachel Krische interrogate how they can be considered as a living archive to generate new performance work. Performed in Leicester Gallery, Please Do Touch aims to provoke the audiences' personal memories as they recall and share their own histories through movement, spoken and sung responses.

SUE AUSTIN

'Creating the Spectacle?' Transforming preconceptions by looking from a different perspective 6-7pm, Vijay Patel Building 4.05 FREE

Sue Austin is a multimedia, performance and installation artist with a socially engaged practice. As Artistic Director of Freewheeling she "recognises the power of starting at the 'personal' and finding archetypal, numinous images that 'communicate' through connecting with the universality of human experience." She aims to find dramatic and powerful ways to reveal the 'hidden secret' of disability, arguing that this 'secret', if explored, valued and then shared, can act to heal the divisions created in the social psyche that define the 'disabled' as 'other'. 'Creating the Spectacle!' presents a ground-breaking series of live-art and video works of an underwater wheelchair, and work is in development to extend this artwork into another dimension by taking to the skies in a wheelchair that both flies and dives. Sue talks about her artistic practice, including the journey she went on with the artwork that led to an audience of two hundred million people worldwide.


